Philanthropy plays a crucial role in shaping the future of health care by enabling innovation, expanding access to care, and supporting underserved communities.

> With the help of compassionate donors, over the past year we've been able to fund world-class, clinician-led research aimed at advancing patient care and improving outcomes in fields such as cancer and orthopaedics. We've also invested in the education and training of our health care workforce, and supported the acquisition of state-of-the-art surgical equipment, including mobile robotic imaging technology and a cranial ultrasound probe, which have already led to significantly improved outcomes for patients with brain cancer.

Outpouring of community support for world-class robotic surgery

The people of Bendigo and surrounds have come together to bring the very best health care to their local hospital for generations to come.

Thanks to the overwhelming support of the local community. St John of God Bendigo Hospital has acquired advanced da Vinci Xi robotic surgery technology. offering minimally invasive procedures with faster recovery for patients. This innovative technology also reduces the need for long travel and financial burdens for patients in regional and rural areas.

Associate Professor Janelle Brennan, urological surgeon at St John of God Bendigo Hospital, has been advocating for the benefits of making robot technology locally available for years. As a member of the community, she is also acutely familiar with the challenges regional patients face.

"Too often rural and regional Australians feel like second class citizens," A/Prof Brennan said.

"I feel passionately that our community, including me and my family, have access to the same care as someone who lives in Melbourne."

A/Prof Brennan has played a key role in the fundraising campaign for the da Vinci robot. Her dedication to this cause is a reflection of her deep passion for improving health care in the area.

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"It has an extraordinary impact, not just in the urology sphere where the robot is well recognised, but it enables us to really increase the complexity of surgery that we can do in the thoracic space, and the gynaecology space. We hope that the robot will enable us to provide a gynaecological oncology service," A/Prof Brennan said.

"So as well as improving the number of surgeries and how we do it, it'll also improve the scope of the surgery we can provide in the region.

"A second important reason – attracting the very best health care professionals to our hospital is dependent on having the most up to date technology. We know that the amount of doctors that are available for regional Australians are much less per head compared to our metropolitan colleagues. We believe this new technology will

sure our local patients receive
the best possible care with
recruitment of the up and coming
next generation of surgeons."

The local community has truly come together to support St John of God Bendigo Hospital's bold fundraising goal for the da Vinci Xi surgical robot. Generous donations from individuals, families, businesses, clubs, and community groups have turned this ambitious vision into a reality, and this incredible achievement will have a lasting impact on the Bendigo and Loddon Mallee region for many years to come.

A/Prof Brennan expressed her extraordinary thanks to donors for their generosity and their faith in their local hospital to make the robotic surgery program a success.


"We can never thank them enough," A/Prof Brennan said.

Your support brings compassionate care to breast cancer patients



1 in 7 women will receive a breast cancer diagnosis in their lifetime. Thanks to new research, treatments and early detection, the survival rate for breast cancer has greatly improved in the past few decades - however for anyone who has received a breast cancer diagnosis, it can still be incredibly confusing. frightening and difficult to navigate.

Thanks to your compassionate support for our Winter Appeal, and a generous philanthropic commitment from a longstanding donor, a specialist Breast Care Nurse position has been expanded at St John of God Murdoch Hospital to support more patients from when they first receive their breast cancer diagnosis, and throughout their treatment.

Breast Care Nurse Jennifer Mager has seen firsthand the impact this service can make for patients on their breast cancer journey. For many patients, Jennifer comes into their lives at a very overwhelming and frightening time. Often, they've just received their diagnosis completely out of the blue.

"The Breast Care Nurse role is being able to guide someone through their whole journey from start to finish," says Jennifer.

"If they've just had their appointment with the consultant, sometimes all they hear is the

words 'breast cancer' and they don't hear anything else. So by the time I talk to them, they have a lot of auestions."

A key aspect of Jennifer's role is helping patients through the process of surgery. chemotherapy and radiation, as well as supporting them with information and access to other services such as social workers. physiotherapists, and other allied health professionals. But beyond that, she is a consistent source of comfort and reassurance for patients and their families – a familiar, friendly face they can count on as they navigate the challenging cancer journey.

"I recently received a card from a patient. It said, Just having someone hold my hand for a bit, and talk me through the surgery and tell me it's going to be okay,' iust gave me a sense of relief." recalls Jennifer.

"I think that's what I would want. someone telling me it's going to be okay, and telling me what comes next. It's a very rewarding experience and a rewarding job."

Jennifer is keen to raise awareness of the importance of the support that a Breast Care Nurse provides to patients, so that hopefully the service can grow and support more patients in future. She also expressed her immense gratitude to the donors who have supported her to keep doing the work that she is so passionate about.

Donor support brings state-of-the-art equipment to St John of God Geelong Hospital's Intensive Care Unit

In today's ever evolving health care landscape, the critical care environment faces unprecedented challenges. St John of God Geelong Hospital's Intensive Care Unit (ICU) caregivers frequently care for patients who need intensive monitoring and treatment for life-threatening illnesses or serious injuries, often requiring round-the-clock care from a dedicated team of specialist doctors and critical care nurses. unwell. This allows caregivers to focus more on patient care, interaction and support. Additionally, a more comfortable environment can help to alleviate anxiety in patients."

Sharnie also reflected that high quality equipment supports better health outcomes for the community.

"Not having access to the best equipment can lead to poorer patient outcomes and increased complications. Lack of access to modern equipment can reduce efficiency, increase frustration and decrease staff morale," Sharnie said.

Sharnie expressed her gratitude to the donors who helped to make the new equipment a reality at St John of God Geelong Hospital.

"Your contribution is more than just a financial gift, it is a gift of comfort, dignity and improved care for our patients," she said.

How Zuhal is helping the planet... and our patients!

Sustainable fashion designer turns hospital scrubs into fundraising collection



During her stay at St John of God Mount Lawley Hospital, sustainable fashion designer Zuhal Kuvan-Mills noticed the scrubs worn by the nurses and wondered what happened to them once they were no longer in use.

"I was speaking to the nurse on duty pre-surgery, and we talked about the amount of potential textile waste across many industries where staff wear uniforms," said Zuhal.

Inspired by this exchange, Zuhal decided to take some end-of-life scrubs and upcycle them into a high-fashion runway collection that was unveiled at Eco Fashion Week Australia 2024. Collaborating with other local design labels including Fabric of Nature and Deadly Denim,

she debuted a new clothing line featuring beautifully unique dresses. skirts, and tops. The collection was named Agua in a nod to climate change and Australia's water scarcity.

In addition to the environmental message, Zuhal saw an opportunity to support those in need. She learned about the St John of God Foundation's Gift of Hope program, which helps Australians facing life-threatening conditions such as cancer. She chose to donate the proceeds from the sale of the upcycled garments to the program, which provides assistance to cancer patients experiencing financial hardship.

Eco Fashion Week Australia was founded by Zuhal in 2017, and in 2024 featured 58 shows across Perth and Busselton, including an unofficial world record attempt for the world's longest catwalk on the Busselton Jetty.

Supporting care closer to home

How Vicki is honouring her husband's legacy and bringing world-class cancer care to regional Victoria

For people living in regional and remote areas, the challenges of a cancer diagnosis are often amplified. In addition to the emotional stress, fear, and overwhelm that comes with cancer, those living far from major cities face the added burden of long travel times, extra costs, and being away from home, work, school, and their support networks.

Vicki Jellie understands this experience all too well. In 2008, her husband Peter was diagnosed with oesophageal cancer. Like many cancer patients in regional Victoria, he had to travel long distances for vital radiotherapy treatment. Over the course of his 20-week journey from diagnosis to sadly passing away at the age of 49, Peter spent 12 weeks away from home, separated from his family and support network.

In honour of Peter's wish to bring radiotherapy closer to home, Vicki and her family established 'Peter's Project'. Initially a lobbying group, the charity worked with both State and Federal governments to highlight the need for improved cancer services in South West Victoria. They advocated for better access to radiotherapy treatment for people in regional areas, aiming to ensure the community had access to the same level of health care as their metropolitan counterparts.

A formal board and working committee were set up to lead the charge.

Once the need for better cancer care was clear, the community rallied together to support the cause, and the centre officially opened in July 2016.

"We have been very pleased to support St John of God Warrnambool with various cancerrelated equipment and services over the past 10 years," said Vicki.

"Many patients from a wide expanse of the Warrnambool region benefit from these contributions we have been able to make, which results in great health and wellbeing benefits to many, for generations to come."

In the past year alone, Peter's Project has funded several key initiatives at St John of God Warrnambool Hospital, including:

- Critical medical equipment for oncology and palliative care services
- A tissue/vessel sealing unit for endoscopy
- A nerve monitoring device for ear, nose, and throat surgery
- A specialised patient bed with a pressure-relieving mattress for palliative care
- Support person pull-out beds for palliative care rooms

Laura Levett, Nurse Unit Manager of Day Oncology at St John of God Warrnambool Hospital, highlighted the profound impact Peter's Project has had on regional patients and their families.



"The equipment we've received ensures we can provide the best possible care to our patients, with the most current equipment," Laura said.

"This not only helps patients recover more quickly but also means they can undergo procedures locally, rather than travelling to metropolitan hospitals."

On behalf of the hospital, Laura expressed deep gratitude for the ongoing support of Peter's Project.

"If it wasn't for all the support of Peter's project over the years we simply wouldn't be able to maintain our wonderful standards of care that we provide to our patients with the very best equipment. On behalf of all our staff and patients I would like to say a massive THANK YOU for their generous support – it means the world to us and helps us continue our excellent work."



Visionary philanthropy changing lives for WA children

Funding from Telethon will help bring innovative new initiatives to life, including:

Humidifiers and Nitric Oxide for Neonatal Oxygenation:

These technologies will provide critical support to vulnerable neonates, particularly those born prematurely. By enhancing respiratory function and promoting lung development, these tools give fragile infants a stronger start in life.

Moort Boodjari Mia Safe Sleeping and Essentials

Packs: These packs will equip Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander mothers and babies at St John of God Midland Hospital with essential resources, helping to create safer sleeping environments and reduce the risk of Sudden Unexpected Death in Infancy (SUDI). Seventeen Telemetry Fetal
Monitoring Machines: These
devices enable continuous,
wireless monitoring of fetal
heart rates, allowing mothers
greater mobility during labor
while providing real-time data for
informed decision-making and
improved care.

Seven Billistick 2.0 Devices:

This innovative tool streamlines jaundice assessment and treatment, reducing the need for painful blood tests and cutting down on waiting times for pathology results, ultimately saving critical time in caring for newborns.

Eight Purpose-Built Toy Cars:

Designed to transport children from the ward to the operating theatre, these toy cars will ease anxiety, reduce stress, and help create a more child-friendly hospital experience.

In addition, Telethon's generosity will establish the Midwifery Outreach Service through Moort Boodjari Mia at St John of God Midland Hospital, with additional support from the Stan Perron Charitable Foundation. This new service will provide antenatal and postnatal care to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women and their children in Midland and the Wheatbelt region. It will be the first program of its kind in Western Australia, bringing care closer to the communities that need it most.

"This funding will have a transformative impact on the families using the Moort Boodjari Mia service by providing enhanced support, access, and resources tailored to their unique needs," said Jodee Hollingsworth, Aboriginal Maternity Group Coordinator and clinical midwife.

"By addressing barriers like transport, culturally appropriate care, and resource availability, we aim to create a safer and more supportive environment for Aboriginal women and their babies. This funding will not only improve immediate health outcomes for mothers and children but also contribute to stronger, healthier families for generations to come."

Jodee also expressed her heartfelt thanks to Telethon and Stan Perron Charitable Trust for their immense support.

"You are helping to create safer, healthier futures for these women and their families, breaking cycles of disadvantage, and empowering communities for generations to come. Thank you for investing in a brighter, stronger future for us all. Together, we are driving change that truly matters."
